BOARD SPECIAL COMMITTEE LIAISON REPORTS

- Board of Directors, SPSCC Foundation Trustee Clarkson reported:
 - The Foundation's Student Success Campaign Feasibility Study came back with positive results. The recommendation from Sparrowhawk Consulting is a \$2-3 million campaign after a marketing campaign has been conducted.
 - The Foundation raised over \$30,000 through employee giving; up 41% of employees giving through payroll deduction; largest percentage of giving to date.
 - o Clipper Scramble is on June 2.
 - The Experience is on October 7, and this year's theme is "Be the key to student success—unlock possibilities."
- Trends in Higher Education Trustee Davis had no report.
- ACT Legislative Action Committee (LAC) Trustee Fuller reported the following:
 - Bills that have survived cutoff and scheduled for Senate Higher Education Committee hearings: HB1130 Customized Training Program Bill; HB1913 Leasehold Excise Tax Exemption Bill; Corrections Bill passed and the companion House Bill passed, and progressing along.
 - On March 16 the Washington State Economic and Revenue Forecast Council will issue its latest economic and revenue forecast, which will inform the first draft of the Legislature's operating budget, and which will be released by the Senate on March 20.
 - Budget and Finance (Quarterly Reports: September, February, May). Trustee Mah reported that the Budget and Finance Committee will meet on March 28, 2017.

REPORT FROM THE COLLEGE PRESIDENT

 - The faculty and other employees are getting the Great Colleges to Work

for 2017 Faculty/Staff Survey, a workplace atmosphere survey. Results will be out this summer.

- Annamary Fitzgerald, ABE Professor and Faculty Union President, reported the following:
 - Statewide nationally, AFT is looking at impacts of the immigration restrictions. Several ESL (English as a Second Language) and Transition Studies faculty attended an informative Know Your Rights workshop at St. Martin's University.
 - They are continuing to work with administration to solve some of the college's nursing faculty recruitment challenges.
 - They continue to monitor potential workload impacts as the Guided Pathways develops.

INFORMATIVE REPORT

Strategic Plan--Core Theme #4

Chief Information Officer Lori Casile and Institutional Researcher Jennifer Tuia, presented an update on Core Theme #4: Champion and Reward Innovation. They reviewed the following presentation with trustees who received their copy of the PowerPoint presentation prior to the meeting.

- Definition: "Innovation is the process of translating an idea or invention into a good or service that creates value."
- What's being measured: Innovations by Individuals and Innovations by Teams
- Some Collaborative Innovations--New and Continued: 25Live, Start Here Desk, Website/Portal Launch, Outsource of Bookstore, Guided Pathways Launch, Class Schedule, Undergraduate Research, e-Learning Faculty Workshops, Embedded Tutoring, College Success Course, Nursing DTA
- Single Unit Innovation--New and Continued: Data Dashboards, Financial Aid Barrier Reduction, Print from any Device, Live Video Contract Training, Bucket Classes, IBEST/ABE Contextualization, High School 21, Academic Warning Policy, English Support Classes
- Measurable Highlights of Innovation Initiatives:
 - Maturation of Innovations started in 2014-15
 Increased Embedded Tutoring: 41 tutors; Academic Dismissal is on a continuous decline; More than 20 dashboards and close to 1,000 views on our most popular dashboard; Significantly more students receiving a high school credential; Math bucket courses enrollment has doubled
- Working on the following: Universal Design Training; Increase hybrid/online course offerings to provide more flexible scheduling for students; New Advising Model; e-Learning Quality Rubric; Educational Planner for underrepresented students; Scholarships for underrepresented students; Use of shared SmartSheets for Operational Plan transparency; Brewing & Distilling Center; New Class Scheduling Plan; Radius CRM; Starfish (data-driven advising and

intervention for student success); Automation of financial aid forms and processes; More Co-Op Internships; Online streaming of athletic events; Active fundraising for Athletics.

Health and Wellness Center

Vice President for Student Services Dr. Dave Pelkey, Dean of Student Engagement & Retention Jennifer Manley, and student Senator for Legislative Affairs Kate Armstrong, presented information on the Health and Wellness Center.

Project History:

- 2015: ASB Student Senate Sub-Committee participated in Campus Visits February-December and developed student priorities list
- 2016: Student Feedback conducted student-wide survey; feasibility study launched to explore opportunities; met with students June 2016 to review survey results and gather input
- 2016-2017: June to present Student leaders have partnered with the design committee to draft floor plan options; Student Senate reviewed and approved moving forward with a design plan and associated fee structure

Project Site: Building 31 Gymnasium and Building 33 Developmental Education Center Benefits:

- Student Activities & Inter-collegiate athletic programs
- Increased access to recreational fitness/sports programs
- Additional study spaces
- Versatile space to include an information desk, coffee and snack bar
- Enhanced instructional offerings

Project Funding: Cost: \$16,000,000; Current Fee: \$1.90/credit; Additional Fee: \$4.10/credit; Total Fee: \$6.00/credit for 20 years to be able to finance the \$16M loan.

Dr. Pelkey noted that the State of Washington will not fund gymnasiums, so we cannot submit this as a capital construction project. We have the opportunity to partner with our students in a Certificate of Participation (COP). The COP would allow us to take out a loan—as the intended revenue source for the project.

Senator for Legislative Affairs Kate Armstrong reported that there have been forums and other opportunities for students to learn about the project, view diagrams, and discuss related student fees. She said that students are very engaged and excited about the project and they are completely fine with the student fees because they thought the amount justifies the benefits for students.

Next Steps:

- Students will conduct campus-wide student vote in April 2017 for fee approval
- Board and State approval process
- Estimated construction start date: November 2018; Estimated completion date: June 2020
